We had a very special experience with the Peachland Rotary Club as President Chris Boyle secured the City Council Chambers for our meeting with the board!



Every December the Revelstoke Rotary Club host all of our exchange students for the popular "Weekend in the Snow". The photos here show a huge train snowplow that we saw when we visited a local museum, and a Rotary monument dedicating a park at the museum.

This brings us to the neighboring city of Salmon Arm and 3 clubs visits. Below are some of the great Rotarians we met. 
around the world! What, you don't know what that is?? It is the science of producing and using plants for food, fuel, fiber and land reclamation!

Ken Arthur (to my left) said there were not enough hotel rooms in Salmon Arm to accommodate the 900+ attendees to his 1996-97 District Conference, so they rented 40 houseboats on the Shuswap Lake for visiting Rotarians to stay! On my right is Jeff Den Biesen who was Ken's conference chairman, and exactly 10 years later he became District Governor (2006-2007). BTW I checked with four different people and it was indeed common to have 800-900 attendees at district conference back in those days. The final picture in this group, in the lower left frame, is Jan and I with AG Sterling Land and Salmon Arm Club President Warne Lynd. The Salmon Arm Daybreak club took us to one of their projects, a "Spray & Splash" park.



One of the more interesting service projects we discovered was the Salmon Arm Club receives a \$10,000 grant from the city every year to plant 325 hanging baskets of flowers all over the city! All of the cities we visited in British Columbia this summer have an abundance of hanging baskets and flowers everywhere you turn. Cities compete for awards for having the most beautiful flowers. The net results are absolutely incredible, as a few examples below will show you!!



We made one more swing through Kamloops and toured the Rotary Bandshell on the Riverfront Park. What makes this project so valuable, much like the Kelowna Rotary Center for the Arts pictured above, is that events are frequently announced in the paper they are always identified as being

and on the radio, and "at the Rotary Bandshell"!! Great PR.
